Making Providence Visible at La Posada

Early on the morning of October 6, Sr. Barbara McMullen and Associates Rose Vierdag and Linda Hoefflin left Granite City, IL, for La Posada Providencia, a sponsored ministry of Divine Providence, in San Benito TX — a trip of 1,135 miles. We took with us a load of supplies donated by the Associates and Sisters of the St. Louis and Tennessee areas, including in-kind donations of toiletries and other essentials amounting to \$527, Wal-Mart gift cards, and \$200 in cash for the La Posada building fund.

After driving for 14 hours, we stayed overnight at my sister's home in Porter, TX, before continuing our journey. We were able to attend Sunday Mass at St. Martha's Church, only a few blocks away. There is nothing like celebrating Mass with a group of faith-filled people.

The mission experience at La Posada was, to say the least, eye-opening. First, Srs. Zita Telkamp, Margaret Mertens, and Therese Cunningham deserve medals. During my work as an operating-room nurse, I was often on call, and I know how grueling it

can be. But these Sisters are on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. I can't imagine the stress, loss of sleep, lack of food, and emotional and physical toll this schedule takes on the Sisters' lives.

Second, any misconceptions I may have had about La Posada were quickly erased upon our arrival. A recent client from Zimbabwe brought the total number of countries served there to 86. No longer are only Hispanics served; during our four-day stay, La Posada

It turned out to be Mary Flick, CSJ Sister and CDP Associate, there to visit Srs. Maura and Marlene Luffy, who had mentored her during her years of discernment for religious life.

I had always wanted to meet Mary to find out how a person came to be BOTH a Sister of one community and an Associate of another. Mary's example struck me as a symbol of the future of religious life for all of us—Sister and Associate, hand-in-hand. Although she later discerned her call to be a Sister of St. Joseph, Mary maintained her tie as a CDP Associate. "I was not going to give up my Associate relationship with the CDPs," she said. I love how Mary did not approach her religious life as an "either/or" experience but a "both/and."

There is strength and growth awaiting us all if we take a lesson from Mary and open ourselves to the Spirit and each other as we do life together. In light of all that has happened in the past several months, both good and bad, we are part of a new Church emerging. I hope we will take part with a "both/and" attitude and partner with Sisters and Associates in many religious communities across the world to create a better, stronger Church.

Our Strategic Intent group on Partnering as Sisters and Associates is planning an event in the spring to discover how we can work together in TRUE PARTNERSHIP. Meet an Associate: Terry Southerland

Terry Southerland was raised as a farm girl in Lincoln County, MO. Her father was one of 14 children and had three sisters who chose religious life: an Ursuline, a Sister of Divine Providence, and a Cenacle Sister. The sister who became a CDP, Sr. Jerome Roberts, was also Terry's godmother. Sr. Jerome took that job very seriously. As Terry puts it, "I think she prayed me into the convent and managed to keep me there from a freshman in high school to the June before I would have made perpetual vows." And, Terry continues, "My convent years, which covered age 14 to 24, are held in my heart as memories of family."

After she left Mount Providence, Terry often went back to visit her classmates and the Sisters who taught and guided her. When she met James, her husband-to-be, she brought him to the Sisters for approval, and "he had them all at his beck and call. They knew he was a coffee drinker of great intensity and that he was addicted to all things chocolate." Terry's ties to the community remained very strong, and on one of her visits, "Sr. Lucy sat me down and asked, or maybe told me, I needed to become an Associate. Becoming an Associate was like stepping back into the convent for me. I realized I missed the sense of community I had always felt there."

Terry reflects that she has spent 37 years of her life among the CDPs and has "absolutely no regrets, only fond memories." Says Terry, "I am extremely blessed to have had a wonderful family by blood, a marvelous group of women who made up my convent family, and friends who make up my family of faith."

had 40 clients in residence from Eritrea, Honduras, El Salvador, Guatemala, Zimbabwe, and the Congo. As Sr. Barbara reflected, "If I ever wanted to know what hope looked like, I just have to see the faces of the men, women and children who come through the doors of La Posada and are welcomed warmly."

Each client is provided with a place to stay, food, clean clothes, and showers. For four hours a day, clients receive lessons in reading and writing English, and basic concepts such as numbers and colors and many other life skills. We spent much of our time at La Posada teaching these classes. When we were not in the classroom, we were mowing the yard, painting walls, and doing whatever other tasks were necessary.

I am in awe of the tremendous work that occurs there on a daily basis. It takes many hands and donations to assist La Posada in opening the doors each day. As Rose Vierdag commented, "Every Associate should experience a day at La Posada." My prayers will be stronger than ever for this powerful ministry.

The Pittsburgh-Ohio-Michigan area recently welcomed four wonderful new Associates. The spiritual journey that led up to this event included three parts.

Part 1: October 27-28, 2017: Overnight Retreat at Kearns Spirituality Center. After dinner with the
Sisters at Providence Heights on Friday evening, the

group gathered at Kearns for an opening prayer by Local Coordinator Maryann D'Alessandro and a get-acquainted activity led by Sandy Stevenson, also a Local Coordinator. Sr. Marian Senish gave a presentation on the various kinds and aspects of prayer, followed by a wine and cheese social.

A Day Along the Pilgrimage


Among the many incredible experiences I had during the Associate Pilgrimage to Germany in April 2018 was a visit to the Finthen-Mainz Residence House/Archives and School. We were greeted there by all of the Sisters in residence as well as by Sr. Clementine Fritscher, Provincial Leader of the Ketteler Province. I also had the opportunity to meet and chat with Sr. Veronika Wauch, whom I had heard so much about from Sr. Anne Winschel. After introductions, Sr. Hildegard Ewalt, one of our host guides for the week, described the various places we would have the opportunity to tour at this location.

We visited the chapel and the Ketteler Archives Building, which houses the bed where Bishop Ketteler died and other personal items he owned. Along the garden path we walked to the on-site elementary school is a huge beautiful old oak tree which was alive during the time Mother Marie lived. It was very moving to reflect that these were the same paths that she walked and the trees that she saw and touched. Everything I had learned about our Founders during my Associate Inquiry sessions in 2011 was coming to life. After a tour of the school, we visited the Community Archives. As Finthen was the very first residence of our Sisters, the archives hold CDP files. historical documents, and memorabilia from all over the world. I was able to see Mother Marie's ring and hold her cross. The deep emotional connection I felt while holding her cross was a spiritual experience.

The day in Finthen finished with a traditional German meal at the Hotel Zum Babbelnit restaurant. Sr. Clementine and the Sisters of the Finthen-Mainz Residence provided us top-notch hospitality. I was very grateful for the opportunity to visit and experience this beautiful place where our Community began. I hope to return again someday.
