From the Director



As I sit watching the rain fall and an occasional cardinal fly into view, I wonder what is in store in the coming weeks for me, my family, my town, my state, my country, and the world. The dark skies and the stripped trees feel cold and damp. Dawn arrives late and dusk comes early.

But Advent is approaching, and for me it is a time of fond memories. Sisters and Associates would pray a Christmas novena beginning on December 16 at Mount Providence in St. Louis. The chapel was dimly lit, and I remember the smell of incense. With Sr. Joan Albaugh at the piano, we sang a different "O Antiphon" for each night. It was a holy time, a time of expectation and a time of preparation.

The holy surrounded me as I prayed with Community before the exposed Blessed Sacrament, engulfed in the graces free-flowing from Jesus. As I knelt in stillness, I was reminded of a night when Mary and Joseph sought shelter.

For seven of the nine days, we prayed a different O Antiphon: O Wisdom of the God most high, O Leader of the House of Israel, O Root of Jesse's Stem, O Key of David, O Radiant Dawn, O King of all Nations, and finally, O Emmanuel, our King and Giver of Law. On the ninth day, or December 24, the Gospel of Luke recounting the gathering of the Jews for the census was read. My expectation rose with each night, knowing that soon I would celebrate the birth of Jesus.

Outward signs of preparation are all around me. With the decorating of a tree, the hanging of lights, the search for the perfect gift, and preparations for family gatherings and special meals, I make ready for Christmas day. But, what of my internal preparations? Again, the Christmas novena, reminds me to prepare my heart and soul for the coming of my Lord. Can I speak a gentle word to someone who is hurting? Can I feed the hungry? Can I spend time with an elderly person? What else can I do to prepare my heart to be that room at the inn?

May I suggest that each of us say a Christmas novena to feel the holy, to expect Jesus' birth, and to prepare ourselves for what God has in store for us. I will post the novena daily on the Associate Facebook website beginning December 16, 2020.

Boletín de otoño / invierno para los asociados(as)

Mientras estoy sentada mirando la lluvia caer y a un cardenal volando ocasionalmente ante mi vista, me pregunto qué nos espera en las próximas semanas, tanto a mí, mi familia, mi ciudad, mi estado, mi país y el mundo. Los cielos oscuros y los árboles desnudos se sienten fríos y húmedos. El amanecer llega tarde y el anochecer llega temprano.

Pero se acerca el Adviento. Es una época de buenos recuerdos para mí. Las Hermanas y algunos Asociados (as) de la Casa Madre Mount Providence en St. Louis rezarían una Novena de Navidad a partir del 16 de diciembre. La capilla estaba tenuemente iluminada y recuerdo el olor a incienso. La Hermana Joan Albaugh sentada al piano mientras cantábamos una "Antífona Oh" diferente para cada noche. Era un tiempo santo, un tiempo de expectativa y un tiempo de preparación.

Lo sagrado me rodeaba mientras oraba con la Comunidad, unidas ante el Santísimo Sacramento expuesto. Estaba sumergida en la gracia que fluía libremente de Jesús. Mientras inhalaba el incienso, recordaba que mis oraciones, eran elevadas al cielo y serían contestadas. Mientras me arrodillaba en silencio, recordaba que en una noche María y José buscaron refugio.

Faltaban nueve días para la mañana de Navidad. Mis expectativas aumentaban cada noche, sabiendo que pronto celebraría el nacimiento de Jesús, mi Dios. Durante siete de los nueve días, rezaba una antífona diferente: Oh Sabiduría del Dios Altísimo, Oh Líder de la Casa de Israel, Oh Raíz del tallo de Isaís, Oh Llave de David, Oh Radiante Amanecer, Oh Rey de todo Naciones, y finalmente, Oh Emmanuel, nuestro Rey y Dador de la Ley. El noveno día o 24 de diciembre se leía el Evangelio de Lucas que relata la reunión de los judíos para el censo. El viaje de una mujer en los últimos meses de su embarazo a lomos de un burro conduce a la expectativa del nacimiento del niño Jesús.

Los signos externos de preparación me rodean. Con la decoración de un árbol, el colgado de luces, la búsqueda del regalo perfecto, y los preparativos para reuniones familiares y comidas especiales, me preparo para el día de Navidad. Pero, ¿qué hay de mis preparativos interiores? Una vez más, la novena de Navidad me recuerda que debo preparar mi corazón y mi alma para la venida de mi Señor. ¿Puedo decirle una palabra amable a alguien que está sufriendo? ¿Puedo alimentar a los hambrien-

Meet an Associate — Mary Carini

In the late 1980s Mary Carini walked into St. Ignatius of Antioch Catholic Community in Antioch, TN (a suburb of Nashville) seeking a parish family after moving to Tennessee from Clarksburg, WV. At that time Mary was a retired executive of Monongahela Power Company in Clarksburg. It didn't take long for her to become an active participant in parish life through her dedication to RCIA, Scripture groups, and prayer groups.

Mary states that she was drawn to become an Associate because of the strong examples of the "special women of Providence" in her life. Mary refers to her meeting of Sr. Maria Patterson, who was the Liturgical Director at St. Ignatius, as her "second call to Providence." "Second," because her first sense of "calling" to Providence was through her friendship with Sr. Loretta Jean Schorr, whom she had met while in Clarksburg.

In 1996 Mary became aware of the Associate relationship in the Community and began her journey with Sr. Barbara McMullen and the St. Louis Associates. Mary was born in Lynnwood, PA, into a very strong Italian family. Both her maternal and paternal grandparents were from Italy. She prides herself on a very strong Italian family heritage, to which she attributes the strength of her faith and her love of family, and she laughingly adds her "love of food" to that list! When she moved to Tennessee, she brought her mother with her and cared for her until her death.

Thanks and prayers to all of you!"

And this from Julia Lynn: "I remember Providence Peace small group meetings on the back porch in the summer and all the tomatoes and other vegetables from the garden that we were invited to take home with us. I remember how the Sisters and Associates who lived at Assumption Convent made me feel at home when I was a brand new Associate and felt a stranger to the Community. And I remember the clambake when Paula Gilchrist and Srs. Janet and Rita invited all the Community, Sisters and Associates, and we ate clams and shrimp and vegetables at tables covered with newspaper in the backyard."

Karen Snyder remembers: "I always felt completely welcome and 'at home' in the convent.
