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Meet an Associate — Mary Pérez

Mary Pérez has been an Associate for 16 years, but her connection with the Sisters of Divine Providence in Puerto Rico began 42 years ago, when she was 8 years old. At that time the CDP Sisters had a convent in San Miguel Parish in Utuado.

Mary's parents had been separated for a long time, and Mary, wanting to befriend and play with other children, decided to follow a group of children who passed by her home on Saturdays. They were going to CCD class, and although Mary was not enrolled and her family did not go to church, Sr. Leticia Plasencia Barrios, the CCD teacher, allowed her — and the pet dog Mary had with her — to stay.

Mary became a regular at CCD, and eventually she was ready to receive her First Communion. When she was asked to bring in her baptismal certificate, it was discovered that Mary had never been baptized! She was baptized just a week before her First Communion.

First taken to the convent by Sr. Leticia, Mary became a frequent visitor there, even sleeping overnight at times, with her father's permission. The Sisters fell in love with her and would sometimes take her with them to visit their families. Eventually, the convent became Mary's home, and the Sisters became her family.

Now living at the CDP convent in Bayamón, Mary sees herself as a member of the Community. "I pray and eat with the Sisters and help as much as I can. It gives me joy to know I can be of service," she says.

Mary is skilled with computers and fixes technology problems for the Sisters. She helped Sr. Maria Torres Meléndez, who is the Coordinator for the Associates in Puerto Rico, to connect the Associates using WhatsApp during this time of pandemic. Thanks to this application, the 15 Associates there meet virtually once a month. "We share with one another and support each other in trying to live the charism of Providence," says Mary.

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Conoce a una Asociada — Mary Pérez

Mary Pérez ha sido asociada durante 16 años, pero su conexión con las Hermanas de la Divina Providencia en Puerto Rico comenzó hace 42 años, cuando tenía 8 años. Sus padres se separaron por un gran tiempo y fue en ese momento que comenzó su historia con las Hermanas de la Divina Providencia que tenían uno de los Conventos en la Parroquia San Miguel del pueblo de Utuado.

Queriendo hacerse amiga y jugar con otros niños, Mary (¡y su perro mascota!) decidió seguir a un grupo de niños que estudiaban los sábados en la catequesis de la Parroquia, que estaba a cinco minutos de su casa. Iban a la clase de Catequesis (CCD), y aunque Mary no estaba inscrita en la catequesis y su familia no iba a la iglesia, la Hermana Leticia, que era la directora del CCD, le permitió a ella —y a su perro— quedarse. Mary se convirtió en una habitual en el CCD, y cuando estaba lista para recibir su Primera Comunión y se le pidió que trajera su certificado bautismal, se descubrió que nunca había sido bautizada. Así que fue bautizada de emergencia, justo una semana antes de su Primera Comunión.

Llevada por primera vez al convento por la Hermana Leticia, Mary se convirtió en una visitante frecuente allí, incluso durmiendo durante la noche a veces, con el permiso de su padre. Las Hermanas se encariñaron con ella y a veces la llevaban con ellas a visitar a sus familias. Con el tiempo, el convento se convirtió en el hogar de Mary, y las Hermanas se convirtieron en su familia.

Ahora que vive en el convento del CDP en Bayamón, Mary se ve a sí misma como miembro de la Comunidad. "Rezo y como con las Hermanas y ayudo en todo lo que puedo y comparto en la vida de comunidad. Me complace saber que puedo ayudar," dice.

Mary tiene conocimientos en computadoras y soluciona problemas tecnológicos para las Hermanas. En este tiempo de la Pandemia Covid-19 ayudó a la Hermana María Torres, quien es la Coordinadora de Asociados en Puerto Rico, a conectar de manera virtual a los Asociados por medio de la aplicación WhatsApp. Gracias a esta aplicación los 15 Asociados se reúnen una vez al mes. Mary travels more than an hour each day to the Pontifical University campus in Arecibo, where she works in the Student Life program. She also serves as secretary for a total of eight offices there. Many of the students benefit from the student help program because they are very poor. Some of them live in the mountains, where their homes and communities were devastated by the hurricane. They wanted to continue their studies after the storm but had no money.

Mary discovered that some students were sleeping in their cars and going without food and other basic needs. "Twice a week, the Sisters in Bayamón prepared food for the poorest of the students identified by the institution. With the help of other employees, we distributed the food to these students so they could attend classes all day. Money donated by Sisters and Associates in the U.S. helped make this possible," explains Mary.

A life-long animal and nature lover, Mary is a member of the Association of Animal Protectors of Puerto Rico. Mary and the Sisters cared for a pregnant cat that appeared on the convent doorstep during the hurricane. The cat gave birth to five kittens, and Mary and the Sisters found homes for all but the tiniest kitten, Motita. "She is now quite big," Mary exclaims with a laugh. She also rescued two tiny parrot chicks whose nest was blown out of a tree by the hurricane, and which they had to feed with a syringe. (See photos of Mary with Robby and Rubi on page 3 and below.)

Mary also loves music and directed the parish choir at Utuado for 16 years. She is a very good photographer, and many of the photos of Assemblies and Chapters on the CDP website were taken by her.

Mary would like to express her gratitude first to God, then to the Sisters for letting her be part of their Community. Her heart is full of love for every Sister and Associate in Puerto Rico and in the States, and especially the Sisters at the Motherhouse.

os con los otros y nos apoyamos mutuamente para tratar de vivir el carisma de la Providencia", dice Mary.

Mary viaja más de una hora cada día a la Pontificia Universidad Católica recinto de Arecibo, donde trabaja en el área de Servicios Estudiantiles. También se desempeña como secretaria y brinda apoyo a un total de ocho oficinas. Allí, muchos de los estudiantes en la Universidad son pobres y son ayudados en el Programa de Estudio y Trabajo en el que está Mary. Algunos de estos jóvenes vivían y aún viven en áreas rurales y montañosas donde sus hogares y comunidades fueron devastados por el huracán María. Querían continuar sus estudios después de la tormenta, pero no tenían dinero.

Mary se enteró que algunos estudiantes dormían en sus carros y carecían de alimentos y artículos de primera necesidad. Las Hermanas en el Convento de Bayamón ofrecieron ayudar a los estudiantes más necesitados e identificados por la institución. "Empecé a llevarles el desayuno y almuerzo preparados por las Hermanas en el convento dos veces por semana y repartirlo junto con los empleados de la Universidad para que pudieran continuar estudiando hasta por la noche. La Institución y los estudiantes estuvieron muy agradecidos por ese apoyo, en medio de la gran crisis.

Es amante de la naturaleza y de los animales, de toda la vida; Mary es miembro de la Asociación Protectora de Animales en Puerto Rico. Durante el huracán las Hermanas y ella se preocupaban por una gata que apareció en la puerta del convento, estaba embarazada y dio a luz a cinco gatitos. Mary y las Hermanas encontraron hogares para todos menos para el gatito más pequeño, Motita. "Ahora es bastante grande", exclama Mary, entre risas. También rescató a dos pequeños polluelos de Cotorras cuyo nido fue sacado de un árbol por los vientos del huracán, y que tuvieron que alimentar con una jeringa. Están sobre sus hombros en la foto de arriba.

Mary también ama la música y dirigió el coro de su parroquial en Utuado durante 16 años. Ella es una muy buena fotógrafa, y muchas de las fotos de las

Sue lives in Hawaii and has, for many years, been interested in the Sisters of Divine Providence and their charism. Her interest was sparked initially by meeting and developing a friendship with Sr. Maria Patterson.

Sue's professional career led her to many different positions, each requiring a spirit of service, compassion, and the formation of others. She has served as a high school teacher, college professor, director of educational programs serving Native Americans, manager of communications for federal agencies, manager of international contracting for the DHHS, and manager of training for FEMA.

Last June, Sue reached out to Sr. Maria and they reconnected. Sue had been studying the Sisters' charism, history, and mission for some time, and she now felt the call to join as an Associate.

When I interviewed Sue for this article, I asked her who the person or persons were that had the most impact on

her life. She told me that there were actually four groups. First, her mom, who had emigrated from Italy and suffered discrimination because of the color of her skin. She



taught Sue to offer every action as a prayer and to do everything out of love. Next were people who had been unkind or unjust to Sue over the years. Then her brother Ricky who had died of cancer a few years ago, but taught her how to "fight" in her own struggle with cancer. Finally, the leaders, activists, musicians, and others in the 60s who helped to shape those times as she was growing up.

Without a doubt, the St. Louis Sisters and Associates family is very proud and happy to call Sue one of our own.

How I Was Able to Make a Job a Ministry

I work as a Covid-19 Case Investigator for the State of Pennsylvania.

When we receive a positive Covid-19 test result or (or identify someone with symptoms who is a close contact of a confirmed case), we reach out to them and do an interview. There are three parts to the interview: collect information on symptoms, identify where they might have been exposed to the virus and who they might have exposed after they became infected,

and finally, provide education about isolation and quarantine.

This information is used to track where the virus is in our communities and how it is spreading. The isolation and quarantine measures are used to help limit further spread of the virus. Through these interviews and from the medical community at large, we are continuously learning about the virus and adjusting our recommendations based on our findings.

At some point during the course of the interview, I let the interviewee tell their story and vent anger, frustration, fears, losses, concern about spreading it to a loved one, or disbelief in the pandemic. I take time to thank all those who work and provide services to us during the pandemic as well as those who are following our public health recommendations with no complaints.

To me, this part of the interview is as important as or more important than the information I collect. Taking a few minutes to listen and comfort, support or reassure, and then offer them up in prayer at the beginning and end of my day has become a ministry for me. I am grateful to be of service during this pandemic and pray that an end may be close at hand.
